



Sometimes newly enrolled members have written to me asking "What are these HOT NEWS ENVELOPES you keep going on about?", then complain because they are not getting the latest news. Therefore, this slot is for those who do not understand what this is all about

As you will appreciate, news about release dates. tours, T.V. appearances etc. etc. do not only occur when a magazine is due so, therefore, to be able to afford to keep you all up-to-date, I run a "Hot News" system. Therefore, "Just A Shadow" has been voted the most popular Big Country record of all time by Country (Ubb members).

"Winter Sky" - 52 points
"Sove Me" - 51 points
"Where The Rose Is Sown" - 42 points
"Broken Heart (Thirteen Valleus)" - 41 points

It is interesting to see that we still have the major acts coming to us as, along with Big Country, in the last few months we have also hosted Del Amitri. Neds Atomic Dustbins. Thu and Energy Orchard which should all chart.

My only comment re the Studio business of the last few years is a sad decline in the ability of the new wave of producers and engineers in capturing the performance of groups that record live, both technically and musically. This is probably accountable to the fact that most if & R personnel have related success with dance orientated music and consequently will turn to one figure impresarios using other people's programs and samples to produce music acceptable to the ten to fifteen year olds, which appear to be the bulk of the record buying public.

History has proved that long term careers in the music business have always been based on people who can write songs and play musical instruments properly. A true fan will buy record after record by creative artists whether guitar or singer, but certainly not pre-programmed computers.

In 1966 Rockfield set the course of history by dispelling the myth that the music business had to be centralised in London. Armed with a recording production contract with EMI, the studio first took to the air, a modest start no doubt, but the recoils were eventually to be felt throughout the music business. Many country studios operate under one guise or another, but none can have seen or shared in so many other people's destinies.

Artists like Dave Edmunds, Ace, Queen, Simple Minds, Rush, Adam And The Ants and Robert Plant, as well as many of today's new signings, have and are sharing in this success story, with past help from producers like Gus Dudgeon, Roy Thomas Baker, Robert John Lange as well as new producers now using the studios, the future seems to be assured.

Today, most studios can boast equipment and acoustic designs but we feel that tomorrow's artists will expect and respect the opportunity to have privacy at work. Already Rockfield, yet again, leads the way forward and we consider ourselves with our Natural Echo Chambers and Live Rooms to be thirty years behind but ten years ahead.

PAT MORAN "TALKS"

Q What was your background to production?

I started out in a band - I was lead guitar, played keyboards and wrote the songs. Then I started engineering at Rockfield Studios in Monmouth (South Wales) where I got my first production break.

- Q What was the first record you produced?
 - "Air Waves" was my first album production.
- Q How do you see your role as a producer?

As a producer, I consider it my job to oversee all aspects of the making of the record - I work out arrangements with the band, advise on the choice of songs, choose additional musicians, arrange studios, equipment and budgets, rehearse with the band etc. As an engineer, I also operate the equipment in the studio and get the best possible sounds laid down to tage, mix the completed recordings and attend the mastering (the actual cutting of the record).

Q What attracted you about Big Country when you were initially approached?

I've always been a fan of their music and I really liked their new songs and then, when I met them, I thought they'd be great to work with as we got on so well together and as we all had similar ideas about how the new album should sound.

O How was it, working with Big Country?

Great! This was one of the most enjoyable records I've worked on. There was a great atmosphere in the studio - I think this has come through on the record - the guys were so easy-going and professional, it was a pleasure to work with them.

Q What is your viewpoint on the use of current technology in music: Sampling, the DAT tape, lip synch at live concerts etc.?

I'm all for technology when it can help me get a better sound down to tape - the DAT player has been a great help - much more accurate than cassette. What I don't approve of is artists/producers who use technology to directly sample other people's work - I view this as unprofessional and very unoriginal. Lip synching at concerts is a con and should be banned.

Q Which new bands do you like?

The LA's, Extreme, The Sundays, Black Crowes, Stone Roses.

Q If you weren't a producer, what would you like to do in the music business, and why?

If I had been able to, I would have liked to continue as an artist and writer.

- Q Anyone you fancy producing, if asked?
 - Brian Wilson or John Lennon, if he was still with us.

Q Who would be in your "all time supergroup"?

- Jimi Hendrix (guitar), Lou Gramm of Foreigner (vocals), Steve Winwood (keyboards), John Paul Jones (bass) and John Bonham (drums).
- O Which studios are your favourites to work in and why?

Rockfield Studios in Monmouth, S. Wales, where I did the new album. The atmosphere is very relaxed and friendly and it's in a beautiful location. The worked there for a loing I know the studio inside out and I can get great sounds there. Also, Conway Studios in Los Angeles.

O What have been your most / least successful records?

My most successful record to date is "Shooting Rubberbands At The Stars" by Edie Brickell and the New Bohemians - three million

Least successful was a band called Zot for Elektra Records in L.A. The record company executive responsible for the band left the company immediately after I finished the record and it subsequently did not receive the proper promotion etc.

Q What other producers do you admire?

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- Mutt Lunge, Phil Spector, Brian Wilson.
- Q Which is your favourite song on the new Big Country album and why?

"Kansas". It's a great rock song - good lyrics - I think it's going to be a big single.

Q What specifc qualities do you think Big Country possess?

Stuart's a great writer and front man for the band. All the members of the band are brilliant musicians and work really well together - they're a great live band.

What do you think of the state of the U.K. music industry? If you were in a position to change and improve three things in the industry, what would they be?

If I have any criticism of the industry, it would be that they don't have long term commitment to their acts, perhaps due to the financial pressures brought on by the recession. I would like to change:-

Lower the price of CD's to help break new acts.

More music programmes on T.V.

More live venues and the abolition of ticket touts and booking fees on gig tickets.

O What do you like doing, outside musical activities?

My life is almost totally involved in music. When I'm not actually working in the studio, I'm buying and listening to new albums, looking at new equipment and studios or looking at new bands. My main interest outside the industry would be football.

PEACE IN OUR TIME

Stan Lenkiewicz (Membership No 000414) from New Jersey,

Following remarks about "Peace In Our Time" in the last issue, Stan has written some words on the subject:

"I am writing in regards to last issue's remarks made toward Big Country's 1988 album, "Peace In Our Time". Quite frankly, I was a bit surprised and taken aback by the comments. Firstly, though, I would like to state that this is only my own personal opinion which I am expressing.

When I first heard "Peace In Our Time", I found it to be a highly impressive collaboration of all their prior recordings. found it to contain the traditional sound which has made Big Country so great, but it was in a way which combined their prior sound with a fresh and creative twist. I was still able to Jresn and creative twist. I was said after to detect Big Country's early sound through songs like "King Of Emotion" and "Peace in Our Time", these two songs containing the bagpipe and e-bow treated guitar sound which has made Big Country so unique and great. The album is also full of beautiful ballads which Stuart Adamson is so kind enough to the world to write. A few examples are "Everything I Need", "Broken Heart" and "From Here To Eternity". Also throughout the album . I found great guitar work from Stuart and Bruce as well as great rhythm patterns laid down by Tony and Mark. Also, the most welcomed karate kick barks and bellows by Stuart can be heard in "King Of Emotion", which was patented in earlier work like "Raindance" and that hit "In A Big Country". Not to mention the great tunes already stated, "Peace In Our Time" is an entire album which is a pleasure to listen to both musically and lyrically. Besides the tunes already mentioned Stuart has also painted and created a colourful imagery of lyrics in the album's other stand-out tunes like "Thousand Yard Stare", "Time For Leaving", "River Of Hope", "In This Place" and "I Could Be Happy Here" I think that every cut is a stand-out on "Peace In Our Time"

In closing. I realise that I am no expert when it comes to the art of recording and perhaps I am a bit biased due to my being a great fan of Big Country. I found "P.I.O.T." to be a creative and impressive collaboration of the different sounds of Big Country. Once again, this is only my personal opinion and I can only be the judge for myself!"

Oliver Prange (Membership No 001960) from Verden in Germany.

"When reading through the last fan club magazines. there are always some people saying how disappointed they were of the last album "Peace in Our Time". To those people I must say, I don't really understand you. Just because Big Country did not use their "typical" bagpipe-sound and just because they preferred to play some slower tracks. It doesn't mean the songs are bad or dull or anything.

Im also a Big Country famalic (famatic in a positive way) and I love the baggipe-sound and raunchy guitars like on "Steeltown" but, as the P.10.T album arrived I was not disappointed. Not at all. I think it showed how talented the band really are and that they can do straight rock-titles and slow melodic rock songs as well as their other stuff. I love every single track on that album and I love all their other songs as well.

I also think it is some kind of intolerance to asy that every Big Country song has to sound like Wonderland' or "Fields Of Fire" and otherwise it's not good. That would mean taking away the band's right to develop itself. The only disappointing thing on "Peace in Our Time" was the disappointing sales compared to the other albums. But that always depends on the market at the very moment. In times where must is becoming more and more a computerised thing and artists sell their souls just to make money as quickly and easy as possible, it's getting harder for a band like Big Country to reach good chart positions.

But for me, success doesn't depend on sales and chart places but on how good you do your job and if you're honest to the faits or just interested in their money. And from that point of view, Big Country certainly are one of the most successful bands ever in the music business".

Thanks to both Stan and Oliver for their thoughts. Haven't I come across Stan and Olly before somewhere?

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
